2019 Monthly Programs

January 17- Annual Meeting. Election of officers, awards, short program (15 minutes): "*Cousins, Cousins Everywhere: How many cousins do YOU have?*" **Tammie Gregori** Connecting with cousins can be one of the fun aspects of genealogy. Cousin research, or descendant research, is starting with an ancestral couple, and can be a very beneficial way to work on your family tree.

February 21 - *The Archive at Fort Collins Museum of Discovery.* - Lesley Struc The Archive at Fort Collins Museum of Discovery has something for everyone! The Archive has grown to house over 200,000 photographs, thousands of maps, hundreds of yearbooks, reams of newspapers, and so much more.

March 21- *Untangling Your New England Roots: An Overview from Settlement to Revolution* - John Putnam Many present-day Americans can trace their ancestry back to the Pilgrims or the Puritan Great Migration. John will share the importance to understand New England's history, its settlement patterns, and its town structure to improve your chances to tackle New England brick walls.

April 18- *Extra! Extra! Read All About It: Using Newspapers for Genealogical Research* - Delbert Ritchhart. Newspapers are a great resource for researching one's ancestors and, unfortunately, they are frequently overlooked by genealogists.

May 16- *Family History - Color Commentary* Susi Hickman. This program will give you some ideas on writing rich details about emigration, immigration/Ellis Island, and homesteading, including photographs-passage through time, and demographics.

June 20- *Genealogy Educational Opportunities* Glenn York This presentation will explore the range of learning opportunities available to advance your genealogical skills and knowledge including free and low cost opportunities and national conferences and Genealogical Institutes.

July 18 -*Location is the Key to Finding Your Ancestors* Carol Cooke Darrow. Most genealogy records are created at the county level so it's vital that you learn about the county boundaries, history, population, geography, churches, crops, and occupations of your ancestor's hometown.

August 15- *WikiTree* Eowyn Langholf. Eowyn will present a basic overview of the mission of WikiTree, the features of the site, and the benefits of participating in a collaborative, single, family tree.

September 19 - *How To Plan Your Digital Afterlife* Julie Potter Miller. Your digital presence has grown at a rapid speed. After you are gone, what will happen to your electronic information and photos? Learn how to take control of your digital afterlife.

October 17 - *How-to with Who Do: Inside "Who Do You Think You Are?" with One of their Talking Heads.* Dr. Ann Little. Ann will show a portion of the TV show, and then describe the process she went through with the Who Do researchers, producers, and directors to get to the final filming.

November 21- *Brick Wall Demolition Kit: Linguistic Tools for Genealogists* Sylvia Tracy-Doolos. Discover linguistic tips, tricks and resources that can help you find your most elusive ancestors. Missing ancestors often have more to do with language issues than you might expect. Sylvia will show how to explore the language of your ancestors, to achieve better research results.
